Year I and Year 2

Here are some tips for parents and carers to help your child thrive during this important stage:

Support with Reading

Daily reading

• Reading with your child every day helps improve their fluency, comprehension, and vocabulary. Aim for 10-15 minutes of reading together.

Ask questions

• As you read, ask questions about the story to develop their understanding of characters, events, and new words.

Visit the local library – we have lots to visit in the local area

• Let them choose books that interest them, developing a love for reading.

Encourage Writing Skills



Free writing

• Support your children in developing a love of writing by encouraging them to write for fun. This might be a story, poem or creating a fact file or poster about a favourite animal.

Practice handwriting

• Help your child develop neat handwriting by encouraging regular writing practice.

Spelling practice with Spelling Shed

• Use Spelling Shed to make learning new words fun. The interactive games help them practice their weekly spelling lists in an engaging way.

Play word games

 Games like hangman, word searches, and crossword puzzles help expand their vocabulary and spelling skills.



Strengthen Maths Skills

Use Maths Shed for number practice

Play with numbers in everyday life

• Encourage your child to use Times Tables Rockstars or the maths passports to build fluency with their times tables. Even though times tables are a focus in later years, starting early helps children develop a strong foundation.
